A record luncheon turn out

Attendance at our Luncheon set an all time record. This event has become increasingly popular with our general attendees and this year's numbers were significantly increased by three reunions - the 1947 Sub-Juniors, the 1957 Seniors and the 1967 Seniors and their respective cohorts. Not only did these ladies swell our numbers, but their delight in being together at their old school, their reminiscing and the speeches delivered by their chosen representatives added a real dimension to the whole gathering.

The first of the speakers was Miss Mary Elms who was the organiser of the Sub-Junior group from 1947 and I have included her address below at the special request of many who heard it on the day.

1933! That was a long time ago. In that year the population of Australia was 6,629,839 and the Australian Women's Weekly and the Australian Antarctic Territory were both established. Windscreen wipers became compulsory on cars and the first traffic lights became operational in Sydney. Sir Charles Kingford-Smith made his first flight to New Zealand, Monopoly was invented and polythene was discovered. Bradman scored 103 against the new bodyline attack from the English and the first voice amplification was used. 'King Kong' premiered as did Walt

Disney's 'Three Little Pigs' and Shostakovich's 'Preludes in Moscow' and Errol Flynn made his first film here in Australia directed by Charles Chauval. To mention but a few events. It was a good year. Things were happening. What's more it was the time when in 21st century speak a particular bunch of babies was born. Those girls grew to become the IGGS Sub-Junior class of 1947.

These were the days pre TV, pre mobile phones (wind up telephones existed, but were rare) pre computer, pre microwave. In my case it took one and a half hours to get to town because we had to catch the horse first then harness him to the sulky and jog to the corner of Limestone and East Streets to tie him up while we shopped!

In the year 1947 the School was only 55 years old, but it had already had some very successful girls pass through its doors and was very highly regarded. Some girls came to school by steam train and, if you have read the OGA publication of 'Queenie's Diary', you will have captured the atmosphere of the early days. No air-con or heating resulted in very hot or very cold classrooms and the Commercial students were housed in the shed — an open-air building.

But things have changed and they've changed enormously for the better which is wonderful to see. However, nothing stays exactly the same in our lives except perhaps those intangible elements — our values, our standards, and those elements we hold dear and must defend to maintain. As students here we knew we were being guided extremely efficiently with our education but we also felt that there was a caring coming from those who were guiding us and it meant a great deal to us. We forged friendships which were wonderfully refreshed whenever we met and have given us today, after three score years and ten, a thoroughly enjoyable reunion.

There have been great physical changes to the school, and indeed to the whole world, and vast changes and attitudes in our society with technology demanding more of our attention and time. But the same basic principles imbued in the earliest eras have been maintained for which we are grateful, and we wish the school of the future continued success and much happiness. Whatever the era we are all part of history in the making, and our individual contribution, however miniscule, does count.

Disappointingly, our Dinner was not nearly as well attended which may have been because of the confusion with the Long Lunch - a school function held the previous weekend. However, those who did attend enjoyed themselves and we were delighted to welcome a group of 20 year reunion girls (bottom left).



Amy Chalmers – A life too short

1992 was a very special year at IGGS – our centenary year – and we seemed to have the Midas touch; everything we did turned to gold. One of the great highlights was the winning of QGSSSA Athletics – and one of our golden girls was Co-Captain Amy Chalmers. Amy had a stellar sporting career at IGGS.

After leaving school she worked for some time in fitness, tourism and hospitality before locating to Shenyang City in China where she became involved in teaching English to Early Childhood students. She eventually worked in International TE-SOL teacher recruitment, placement and support.

However, fate dealt Amy a cruel blow and she developed cancer at an early age. She and her family left no stone unturned in their fight to beat the disease but her death, just 25 years after leaving IGGS, left friends and family grief-stricken. The following tribute was penned on behalf of those young IGGS women closest to her.

She was fierce, determined, sassy, hold, independent, courageous, loud, bossy ... she lit up every room she walked into and touched every person she met. She lived hard - worked hard, played hard, partied hard. Amy was an all or nothing girl - it's what we loved about her. And right to the end she was a fighter - she stayed positive and always believed she would beat the cancer. Always.

She was always true to who she was too - a free spirit, a risk taker, a deal doer. She made no apologies for who she was ... and was so very honest - whether we liked it or not. Ha! She was also incredibly spiritual and took us all on a journey of spirituality with her. She called us her soul saving sisters - Paula Wood, Fiona Campbell (Donaldson), Allison Grant, Larissa Cross (Holt), Caet Young (Simes), Josie Kelkhoven and Jean Chalmers (her adoring little sister). The truth is that she saved us ... being on this journey with her was an absolute honour. It brought us all back together and showed us what real friendship is. We will forever be bonded now ... and we'll always be Amy's soul saving sisters.

Valma Ida Bowles (Bell): 1919 - 2017

On 2 September a number of Old Girls attended the funeral of Val Bowles an IGGS Old Girl and mother of Committee member, Jocelyn Smith and her sister Jan Walker. Both daughters delivered part of the eulogy. We heard from Jan of Val's childhood years at Woodend where she attended Blair State School before going to



IGGS. In her Scholarship year she was the only girl to pass this exam. One of the other six to pass was Mervyn Bowles whom she married in 1943 – a union which lasted 62 years. They moved to East Ipswich where they became stalwarts of the Glebe Road Uniting Church, but together their contribution to the community was wide-reaching. when Mervyn's health deteriorated, they moved to Brassall Village where Valma was to become a great favourite.

Jan painted a lovely picture of a life well lived. Jocelyn's descriptions of her mother's lifestyle brought back vivid memories for many.

Saturday morning was baking day. The same ritual occurred every week. Five items had to be produced: Beetroot boiled, peeled and placed in vinegar; a jar of mayonnaise and always a batch of biscuits, a slice and a cake.

Sunday morning the icecream had to be made before we went to church. How many of you remember Carnation Icecream? The tin of carnation milk was placed in the freezer one hour before starting, then came the whipping - whipping - whipping all by hand for many years. Imagine mum's delight when dad bought her a mix master.

Each day of the week was designated for certain chores. Monday was wash day. The clothes had to be hung on the line in a certain way — undies were hung behind sheets so as they could not be seen by the neighbours. Dad played lawn bowls every Saturday so on Monday his bowling clothes were on the line. When we heard mum announce "Pa is hanging on the line" we knew the washing was finished.

Nothing was out of place in her home. The newspaper was read at breakfast and was in the paper drawer by morning tea to wrap the kitchen scraps in. I always said, "if I stood still long enough I would go in the rubbish". Her cupboards were so neat and tidy - not a thing out of place.


Valma helped Jocelyn in her flower business for many years, wiring endless arrangements, and was a wonderful seamstress who also excelled at many handicrafts.
